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

In this season of thanksgiving I am reminded of all for which I am thankful; creaturely comforts, a loving family and friends, a religious

community of caring folk. But I am also reminded that much of the world does not know these things. I sense that my comfortable life is an exception, rather than the rule. Such a grim report you must be saying, and I am saying that to myself. Yet I am reminded that not all people see themselves in "a universe that . . . touches us with love." In this season I am thankful of the too much I have, but I am also troubled by all those who have not.

I trust that by supporting this congregation, we are also serving those in need as we, in a myriad of ways, reach out beyond our doors. The UU Service Committee is one way Unitarian Universalists do reach out to those who will have little to be thankful for this season. We at MVUUF will collect money to support this worthy organization as we fill our Guest at Your Table boxes in January and February.

In addition, this month Dan Narigon and the other endowment trustees will be sharing information about our endowment fund. As we offer support to this fund, I ask that we see it not simply as supporting a building and its staff, but we realize that in caring for this church we enable it to fulfill its mission, which is to serve each other and the suffering people of the world.

November Is Endowment Fund Focus Month

All churches rely on money to encourage growth, to fulfill programming needs and to further the mission set by the congregation. Financial health is determined by the operating fund, cash flow reserves and the endowment fund. The balances and budgets are reported to the Board on a monthly basis and to the Fellowship at our semiannual congregational meetings. This article will focus on the least well-known, and probably most misunderstood, portion of the Fellowship finances: the endowment fund.

The Fellowship established, supports and manages an endowment fund for a number of reasons. Operating funds, capital reserves, and endowment funds are three legs of one stool upon which a healthy and mature organization balances its work and service. Endowments guarantee longevity and emergency assistance, and sometimes provide additional monies for building projects, funding social justice projects or establishing a permanent arts program—necessities that cannot be funded by the general revenue provided annually by the congregation's pledges from members and friends. Creating and administering an endowment fund is one of many ways to care for Unitarian Universalism, a free faith, in a covenanted community of people. Unitarian Universalism is a gift we have received from others. We sit in the shade of trees we did not plant. The trees help us and rely on us and we are the gardeners, the trustees, the stewards who will ensure that the trees are healthy and growing for the next generation to enjoy and "husband."

As religious people who cherish freedom, search for truth, and work for justice and mercy in the world, the trees of our free faith will be our legacy. Good stewardship of financial resources is a very important part of the ethical and religious development of individuals and groups.

MVUUF is blessed to own an endowment fund of approximately \$79,000. We owe a deep debt of gratitude to the contributors to the endowment fund. Approximately half of the endowment fund came from the assets of First Unitarian Church. The remainder has come from individual contributions, including our most recent contribution from the estates of John Gower. We are thankful for his generosity and foresight.

This year we will increase the visibility of the endowment fund. The first task will be to determine the Fellowship's priorities. According to our current bylaws, the purpose of the endowment fund is "to further augment the principles, objectives, program and purposes of the Fellowship by providing a suitable receptacle for the receipt, management, investment and distribution for the Fellowship..."

We need to be more directive and enthusiastic in our desires for the endowment fund. Is it to be a source of funds for social outreach, expansion of our building, supporting the establishment of another UU congregation in the Miami Valley, or other worthy projects? Do we have a target goal for the principal or do we want to just grow it as large as we can? What should we invest in? Should we worry about returns at the expense of social consciousness or should we sacrifice returns to know that we don't invest in anything or any company that we may find objectionable? Do we do good with the money we invest or do we do good with the income from the money we invest? Our current funds are in the Vanguard group, a low-management-fee, mutual fund investment company. The funds we have are balanced between growth and income and perform in line with the other large mutual fund companies.

November has been designated by the Board and the Endowment Trustees as Endowment Fund Focus Month. November is an ideal month to conduct personal financial review and planning prior to the end of the annual tax year. As you look at your personal financial plans please consider contributing to the endowment fund or recognizing the importance of Unitarian Universalism by including us in your estate planning. We will be planning an annual seminar and party to thank past contributors and to help current members and friends with their personal and estate financial planning.

Thank you all for your continued support of the Miami Valley Unitarian Universalist Fellowship. We will be good stewards of the legacy left to us by those who went before and endeavor to increase and expand that legacy for those who follow.

Musician **Jim Scott** brings a *Musical Celebration of the Earth* to the Fellowship on **Saturday**, **November 6 at 7:00 PM**. The music committee at MVUUF is pleased to present acclaimed acoustic guitarist Jim Scott. Jim will perform an evening of his songs of peace and the environment. With insight and more than a little humor, Jim Scott makes his case for harmony in the world with a jazz / world folk music styling and some great guitar technique in accompaniment. Admission is \$10 for adults and \$5 for children, with a family maximum of \$30.

Known to many as the voice on the Winter Consort's "Common Ground," Jim's musical output runs from lyrical songs, and instrumentals, to choral compositions. He has performed in the company of luminaries of the jazz and folk worlds. Pete Seeger said of Jim's guitar virtuosity "(Jim is) some kind of a magician." Paul Winter said of his long time collaborator, "His music sings of the life spirit."

His most recent project has been compiling "*The Earth and Spirit Songbook*," an anthology of songs of earth and peace and he has added many of these songs to his concert repertoire. From this widely varied background, Jim considers himself a contemporary folk artist in the sense that folk music represents people with a positive and hopeful spirit.

"Folk music follows a long tradition of social commentary," Jim said. "It's the voice of the people. That's what I like to think I'm representing." His musical, *The Tree and Me*, has been staged at colleges in New York and Michigan. He also performs for kids and has written songs with elementary school classes. His "Big and Little Stuff-Songs for Kids" marks his fifth recording of original songs released on CD. He's taught at numerous colleges, including Oberlin College in Ohio, and conducted workshops throughout the country.

"My messages are of ecology and social conscience, but also of optimism," Jim said. "I believe in the power of song and self-expression for change." For information about the concert, call Hillary Wagner at 436-3628.
